What is Assessment?

- Assessment looks at how well your child is progressing across all of their subjects.
- Your child will be assessed in numerous ways such as:
 - Quizzes
 - Tests
 - Answering questions in class
 - Classwork
 - Homework
- Two main types of assessment
- 1. Formative Assessment
- 2. Summative Assessment





Formative Assessment

- Louth Academy place huge significance on regular formative assessment to inform classroom practice
- Formative assessment occurs in every lesson and allows students to demonstrate their understanding of the content covered
- The methods of formative assessment used are wide ranging and varied
- They are also low stakes to increase inclusivity
- Allows class teacher to make regular judgements of the understanding of class/individuals and amend teaching and future planning accordingly



Summative Assessment Process

- Students in all year groups have two assessment points during the academic year
- Each assessment provides all students with a progress score in every subject area

 Every assessment is followed by communication with home through Report Comments or Parents Evening



Value of Summative Data

- Provides a summary of where students are, at a particular point in the learning journey
- Allows leaders to identify any trends in student progress
- Informs a targeted intervention programme
- Helps inform decisions on banding and setting
- Facilitates the identification of content which may need to be revisited or re-taught
- An opportunity to adapt planning and teach areas of weakness before moving on to new content



Key Stage 3 Assessment

- Summative assessments are a <u>holistic assessment</u> of how students are performing in each subject area
- Calculated using two methods:
 - Age related expectations
 - Combined score from selected work
- Results are then converted against the progress scoring matrix and student is awarded a progress score for each subject

Reporting to Parents/Carers

 Behaviour and effort are also graded based on the professional judgement of staff. They use a colour and number system like this:

| 1 | Outstanding. |
|---|---|
| 2 | Good. |
| 3 | Varied, could be improved upon. |
| 4 | Unacceptable, sustained improvement needed. |



Reporting to Parents/Carers

• Example of how assessment information is reported:

| SUBJECT | SUBJECT TEACHER | SUBJECT PROGRESS | EFFORT | BEHAVIOUR |
|-------------|-----------------|------------------|--------|-----------|
| Mathematics | Mr X | On Target | 1 | 1 |
| English | Ms Y | Above Target | 1 | 3 |
| Science | Mrs Z | Close to | 2 | 1 |



Student Planners

- Students have a yellow assessment page for each subject in their planners
- Students record progress scores and improvement strategies in their planners after each summative assessment
- Improvement strategies are crucial in articulating to students and parents/carers how they can improve in each subject area
- Students should have planners out on the relevant subject page in <u>all</u> classroom based lessons



Strategies to Support Students

- Alongside revision we recommend students partake in the following activities to support their learning:
 - Attend extra-curricular enrichment sessions
 - Speak to teaching staff about content they find challenging
 - Utilise digital learning programs made available by Louth Academy -Reading Plus, Languagenut
 - Use subject specific websites. For example, Corbett Maths
 - Speak to relatives about content covered in lessons
 - Read for pleasure
